## **Worship Music Notes**

#### Alleluia, He Is Risen!

This triumphant medley of Easter hymn tunes was arranged by Cindy Berry. After the joyful choral fanfare, the choir and congregation join in singing the first verse of *The Day of Resurrection*. For the slower middle verse, which reflects upon Christ's Passion, the choir sings the second verse of *The Day of Resurrection*, but brilliantly paired with the tune from the Passion chorale, *O Sacred Head, Now Wounded*. The joyful "alleluia" fanfare

returns, signaling the third verse, which in turn is ingeniously paired with the tune AURELIA, commonly known as *The Church's One Foundation*. The congregation joins in singing the final verse. Chorusing "alleluias" provide a fitting conclusion.

#### Alleluia, Alleluia! Give Thanks

Both the text and tune of this contemporary Easter hymn were composed by Donald Fishel (b. 1950) for the Word of God Community in Ann Arbor, Michigan, in the summer of 1971. The hymn is a composite of several of Paul's themes, as well as the Easter theme of resurrection. Fishel is a native of Hart, Michigan.

ALLELUIA NO. 1 was composed for this text by Fishel. The arrangement and descant are the result of a collaborative effort by Betty Pulkingham and Fishel, the editors of *Songs for Celebration: Church Hymnal Series IV* (1980).

#### **Risen Indeed!**

This animated, gospel swing-style anthem is appropriate for Easter, Eastertide, and Ascension. Its text is adapted from Luke 24:1-53 and details the story of Jesus' resurrection and appearance to His disciples before His ascension. One basic homiletic theme is spreading the good news: Jesus our Lord is risen indeed!

#### The Trumpet Shall Sound

First Corinthians 15:50-58 powerfully concludes Paul's teaching on the resurrection of Christians, when the last trumpet blasts and Christ returns for those who belong to Him. In that moment, all believers in Jesus, living and dead, will be transformed into the glorified, eternal bodies God has promised us. Death will be defeated forever, never to hurt anyone again. Sin brings death, and the law is the power of sin, but God has given us the victory over death by forgiving our sin through faith in Jesus and by His grace.

#### **Christ Is Alive!**

This text by Brian Wren was written in 1968 with a revision of verse five by the author in 1978 and again in 1988. It was written for the Easter worship of Hockley, Essex, just ten days after the assassination of Martin Luther King, Jr. The hymn pictures the resurrected Christ as deeply involved in the life and pain of humanity and not remote from us.

TRURO is found in the two-volume *Psalmodia Evangelica*, edited by Thomas Williams (1789), where it served as the setting of an Isaac Watts text. In the collection it is written for three voices and bears no composer's name. Little is known of Thomas Williams. The harmonization is by Lowell Mason (1792-1872), musician and composer.

## **Christ the Lord Is Risen Today**

The text was written by Charles Wesley and first published in *Hymns and Sacred Poems* (1739) with the heading "Hymn for Easter." Martin Madan altered it for his collection of 1760, and it has been further altered by the Presbyterian Hymnal Committee. EASTER HYMN is the only surviving hymn tune from *Lyra Davidica* (1708). It is adapted from *Hymns Ancient and Modern*.

## Hallelujah Chorus

Messiah is an English-language oratorio composed in 1741 by George Frideric Handel. The text was compiled from the King James Bible and the Coverdale Psalter by Charles Jennens. It was first performed in Dublin on April 13, 1742 and received its London premiere nearly a year later. After an initially modest public reception, the oratorio gained in popularity, eventually becoming one of the best-known and most frequently performed choral works in Western music.

#### **Toccata**

Charles-Marie Jean Albert Widor (1844-1937) was a French organist, composer, and teacher of the mid-Romantic era, most notable for his ten organ symphonies. His Toccata from the fifth organ symphony has become one of the best known and most often performed works for organ. As of 2022, he is the longest-serving organist of Saint-Sulpice in Paris, a role he held for 63 years (1870-1933). He also was organ professor at the Paris Conservatory from 1890 to 1896 (following Cesar Franck) and then he became professor of composition at the same institution, following Theodore Dubois. Widor was a prolific composer, writing music for organ, piano, voice, and ensembles. Apart from his ten organ symphonies, he also wrote three symphonies for orchestra and organ, several songs for piano and voice, four operas, and a ballet. He was one of the first to use the term "symphony" for some of his organ compositions.

## Worship Art

This Sunday's worship art is paper lace inspired by Luke 24:1-12 titled "Prepared" by Hannah Garrity.

"But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, they came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared.

They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they went in, they did not find the body."

(Luke 24:1-3, NRSV)

I recently read *Art and Faith2* by Makoto Fujimura. Fujimura speaks of the beauty in particular moments in scripture: when the women enter the tomb, and when Mary, sister of Martha, pours oil over Jesus before his journey to the cross. Fujimura draws attention to these texts to anchor a discussion of the importance of beauty in faithful practice. God placed beautiful things on earth for us to give back to God in glory. We must consider when, where, why, and how we engage beauty. We must engage with beauty in our faithful practice.

In this paper lace art piece, the inside of a bowl is patterned with images telling the initial moments of the Easter story. This design depicts burial spices in patterns. Amidst the spice patterns, a sunrise emerges. At the top is an abstract image of the empty tomb.

This moment, the moment when the women arrive at the tomb, represents an act of holy, extravagant, expansive beauty. Imagine being there, arriving at daybreak, holding the spice bowl in your hands. The burial spices, nard and myrrh, were aromatic. The aromas of blood, oils, death, and spices fill the air. Imagine how it would have smelled. It was the work of the women to honor the body of the deceased; to honor the life he had lived, and they had loved.

How might we honor God with our practices of beauty? What materials do we need to gather and incorporate? How can we keep God centered in our creative endeavors?
