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Worship Music

Morning Has Broken

The text of this hymn was written by Eleanor Farjeon (d. 1965) for the tune BUNESSAN. The text appeared first in *Enlarged Songs of Praise* (1931) and in its present form from *The Children's Bells* (1957). Farjeon wrote nursery rhythms and singing games for children. A contemporary popular music recording by Cat Stevens helped make this text familiar to present-day culture. Farjeon was born in London and at 17 became Roman Catholic.

BUNESSAN is a Gaelic melody first published in *Songs and Hymns of the Gael* (1888). It later appeared with the Christmas text "Child in a Manger" (1917). The present arrangement was made for the *Psalter Hymnal* (1987) of the Christian Reformed Church by Dale Grotenhuis in 1985.

Change My Heart, O God

This song was written by Eddie Espinosa, and his own story behind the song goes like this: "The year was 1982. I had been a Christian since 1969, but I saw a lot of things in my life that needed to be discarded. I had slowly become very complacent. I acknowledged my complacency, and I prayed to the Lord. 'The only way that I can follow you is for you to change my appetite, the things that draw me away. You must change my heart!'"

Eddie continued, "Shortly thereafter, I was in my car on the way to my work, feeling a desire to draw near to God and with the wrestling still going on in my heart. Suddenly, a melody and some words began to flood through my mind. As I stopped at a stop sign, I reached for something to write on. The first thing I found was a small piece of yellow paper, which, by the way, I still have, and began to write as rapidly as I could. It was like taking dictation. I wrote the words on the paper, and kept the melody in my mind. Change my heart, O God! Make it ever true. Change my heart, O God! May I be like you. You are the potter, I am the clay. Mold me and make me, this is what I pray."

"Our church home was the Vineyard Christian Fellowship in Anaheim, California, and someone told the pastor

that I had written a song that would be good for the congregation to sing. The pastor asked me to play it for him, and afterwards asked if I would share it with the congregation. From that point on, I began to get reports that my song was being taught in San Diego, Los Angeles, and in many other places."

The essence of Eddie's song is a prayer asking God to change us, making our hearts "true," and changing us into his own image.

Witness

John T. Halloran (d. 1997) was an American composer and choral director. Born in Rock Rapids, Iowa in 1916, Halloran earned degrees in music from Morningside College and Northwestern University. Halloran sang with a male quartet called the Cadets on several Chicago-based radio shows, including "The Breakfast Club with Don MacNeil." He later formed the Jack Halloran Quartet, which appeared on the television programs "Dave Garroway at Large" and "The Pat Buttram Show." Relocating to Hollywood, he became a choral director for films, records, and television, working with such entertainers as Roy Rogers, Pat Boone, Ray Charles, Frank Sinatra, and Dean Martin. He landed the job as choral director and arranger on The Dean Martin Show while working with the singer on his recording of "Volare." Halloran also organized the Jack Halloran Singers, which performed throughout Southern California.

In 1957, Halloran arranged and recorded the current version of the now-popular Christmas song *The Little Drummer Boy* (at the time, titled *Carol of the Drum*) for the Dot Records album *Christmas Is A-Comin'*. However, the recording was not released as a single that year. In response to this Dot producer Henry Onorati, introduced the song to Harry Simeone. When 20th Century Fox Records contracted with Simeone to make a Christmas album, Simeone hired many of the same singers that had sung in Halloran's version and made a near identical recording with his newly created *Harry Simeone Chorale*. It was released as a single in 1968, and later on the album, *Sing We Now of Christmas*. This version became very successful, and has since become a popular Christmas song. The only difference between Simeone's version and Halloran's version, was that Simeone's contained finger cymbals, and had been retitled *The Little Drummer Boy*. Simeone and Onorati claimed and received joint composition credits along with Katherine Kennicott Davis, although the two did not actually compose, write, or arrange it. Halloran never received a writing credit for the song. The song has since been covered by hundreds of artists, including multiple re-recordings by Simeone.

Halloran directed the orchestra and chorus for Bing Crosby's 1958 LP Join Bing and Sing Along. He directed the chorus for Bing's 1962 LPs On the Happy Side and I Wish You a Merry Christmas and Bing's 1971 LP A Time to Be Jolly. He was also a member of the Ray Conniff Singers. Halloran died at 81 of a stroke.

I Love to Tell the Story

William Wilberforce, the Christian statesman and abolitionist, led a fierce campaign in 19th-century England to eradicate slavery from the British Empire. The geographical center of the campaign was a wealthy neighborhood in the south of London known as Clapham, where a group of Anglican evangelicals lived. The "Clapham Sect" also advocated prison reform, education for children, and the expansion of missionary efforts overseas. Though lampooned for their efforts, they changed the world.

Annabella Katherine Hankey was born into this environment in 1834. Her father was a banker in Clapham and a leader in the Clapham Group. Early in life, Kate became involved in religious work. As a young girl, she taught Sunday school; and when she was 18, she organized a Bible study for "Factory girls" in London. (This Bible study was never large, but the girls became close and fifty years later, five of them met together at Kate's funeral.) When her brother fell ill in Africa, Kate traveled there to bring him home. That trip sparked a passion for foreign missions, and in later life Kate devoted all proceeds from her writing to missionary work.

During the winter of 1865-66, Kate, thirty, became seriously ill. The doctors warned her to abandon her Christian activities and remain in bed for a full year. To occupy her time, Kate wrote a poem of one hundred

stanzas entitled "The Old, Old Story." She began the first section, "The Story Wanted," on January 29, 1866. Later that year, she wrote a second section entitled, "The Story Told."

The following year, at the international convention of the Young Men's Christian Association, Major General Russell ended his powerful sermon by quoting from Kate's poem. Songwriter William Doane, in the crowd that day, put a portion of Kate's poem to music, giving birth to the hymn, "Tell Me the Old, Old Story." Another composer, William G. Fischer, set a second portion of Kate's poem to a musical score he named HANKEY, and thus we have this hymn, "I Love to Tell the Story." It was first published in an American hymnbook in 1869, and was later popularized around the world in the great evangelistic campaigns of D.L. Moody and Ira Sankey.

I Know That My Redeemer Liveth

I Know That My Redeemer Liveth is from the third movement of Messiah, George Frideric Handel's masterpiece, and most well-known work. Like the rest of its songs and choruses, the text is entirely based on Scripture, in this case on verses from Job 19:25-26 and 1 Corinthians 15:20. Amazingly, the 260-page libretto of Messiah was written in an astonishingly short 24 days! While he was composing, it is reported that Handel ate next to nothing and that most of the meals delivered to the door of his room remained untouched. Caught off guard by a house servant checking on him at one point during composition, he emotionally declared to the surprised man, "I did think I did see all Heaven before me, and the great God Himself." Incredibly, he had just finished writing a movement which would take its place in history as the Hallelujah Chorus.

Upon its premiere at a charity benefit concert on April 13, 1742, *Messiah* raised 400 pounds and was favorably received by its audience. This signaled a turn of fortune for the then 57-year-old composer, who had given what he considered his retirement performance almost exactly one year prior. Having been plagued by years of setbacks and mounting debt due in large part to the changing favor of the British monarchs, the German-born composer had often found himself competing with the established composers of England, and losing; however, Messiah turned things around for Handel. A year after its premiere, he staged a performance of the work in London, and in spite of controversy from the Church of England, which objected to using the Bible in a secular performance environment, the King attended the show. As the first triumphant notes of the *Hallelujah Chorus* rang out, the King stood to his feet, followed by the entire audience, a tradition that lives on to this day.

Alleluia, Alleluia! Give Thanks

Both the text and tune of this contemporary Easter hymn were composed by Donald Fishel (b. 1950) for the Word of God Community in Ann Arbor, Michigan, in the summer of 1971. The hymn is a composite of several of Paul's themes, as well as the Easter theme of resurrection. Fishel is a native of Hart, Michigan.

ALLELUIA NO. 1 was composed for this text by Fishel. The arrangement and descant are the result of a collaborative effort by Betty Pulkingham and Fishel, the editors of *Songs for Celebration: Church Hymnal Series IV* (1980).

Rejoice, the Lord is King

The text was written by Charles Wesley. A form of the hymn was published in *Moral and Sacred Poems* (1744). It was rewritten and published in *Hymns for our Lord's Resurrection* (1746). It is based on the scripture verse "Rejoice in the Lord always: and again I say, Rejoice" (Philippians 4:4). DARWELL'S 148TH was composed by John Darwall. It was published in Aaron Williams *New Universal Psalmodist* (1770) as the setting for "Ye Boundless Realms of Joy," a paraphrase of Psalm 148.

John Darwall (d.1789) was born in Staffordshire, England, educated at Manchester Grammar School and Brasenose College, Oxford (B.A. 1756), and ordained in 1761. He was curate and then vicar of St. Matthew's Church in Walsall. Darwall composed metrical settings for all 150 psalms in the *New Version of the Psalms of David* (1696). He died at Walsall. The descant is by Sydney Hugo Nicholson.

Worship Art

The children of our church are learning about the liturgical seasons by exploring worship art. The butterflies in worship this morning were crafted by our children. Although butterflies in the Bible aren't mentioned explicitly, their lifecycle is a remarkable illustration from nature of the transforming work of Jesus Christ in the lives of believers.

Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here! (2 Corinthians 5:17, NLT)

The word transform is metamorpheo in Greek, from which we get the English term metamorphosis. It describes the type of change a caterpillar undergoes to become a butterfly. The same word is used to explain Christ's transfiguration. The idea conveys a radical change or complete transformation. At Jesus' transfiguration, his physical appearance was temporarily metamorphosed from an ordinary human to a divine being in all his glory.

As the men watched, Jesus' appearance was transformed so that his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became as white as light.

(Matthew 17:2, NIV)


After a hiatus due to COVID concerns, Singing Ambassadors will meet for two Start-Up Rehearsals.
