Worship Music

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Open Now Thy Gates of Beauty

Benjamin Schmolck (d.1737), the author of this text, was born in Silesia and was considered a splendid preacher, poet, and hymn writer. When he preached his first sermon in his father's pulpit, an influential member of the congregation was so impressed that he gave Schmolck a 3-year allowance to study theology. At the University of Leipzig, he was influenced by Johannes Olearius and others from whom he received "a warm and living practical Christianity, but Churchly in tone and not Pietistic." He was ordained and served as assistant pastor with his father at Brauchitzchdorf. Schmolck was the best-loved hymn writer of his day and wrote 900 hymns. After the Thirty Years' War and the Peace of Westphalia, only one church and three clergy were permitted throughout an entire district of 36 villages. Schmolck ministered in this type of parish for the rest of his life. He was afflicted by strokes, partial paralysis, and cataracts.

Open My Eyes, That I May See

The author and composer of this hymn, Clara Scott (1897), was born in Elk Grove, Illinois. For much of her life, she taught music in the Ladies' Seminary at Lyons, Iowa. Scott wrote many pieces for voice and instruments, including *The Royal Anthem Book* (1882), the first collection of anthems published by a woman. She died at Dubuque, Iowa. The phrase "Open my eyes" is drawn from Psalm 119:18.

Beautiful River

Robert Lowry was born in Philadelphia in 1826. His fondness for music was exhibited in his earliest years. As a child, he amused himself with the various musical instruments that came into his hands. At the age of 17, he joined the First Baptist Church of Philadelphia and soon became active as a Sunday School teacher and chorister. At the age of 22, he gave himself to the work of the ministry and entered upon a course of study at the University of Lewisburg, PA. At the age of 28, he graduated with the highest honors of his class. In the same year of his graduation, he entered upon the work of the ministry. While pastor at Lewisburg, he was also professor of belles lettres in the University and received the honorary degree of D. D. in 1875. He then went to Plainfield, NJ, where he became pastor of Park Avenue Church. In each of these fields, his work was crowned with marked success.

Dr. Lowry was a man of rare administrative ability, a most excellent preacher, a thorough Bible student, and whether in the pulpit or upon the platform, always a brilliant and interesting speaker. He was of a genial and pleasing disposition, and a high sense of humor was one of his most striking characteristics. Very few men had greater ability in painting pictures from the imagination. He could thrill an audience with his vivid descriptions, inspiring others with the same thoughts that inspired him.

"Shall We Gather at the River?" is perhaps, without question, the most widely popular of all his songs. Of this, Mr. Lowry said: "It is brass band music, has a march movement, and for that reason has become popular, though for myself I do not think much of it." Yet he tells us how, on several occasions, he had been deeply moved by the singing of that hymn. "Going from Harrisburg to Lewisburg once, I got into a car filled with half-drunken lumbermen. Suddenly one of them struck up the hymn, and they sang it over and over again, repeating the chorus in a wild, boisterous way. I did not think so much of the music then as I listened to those singers, but I did think that perhaps the spirit of the hymn, the words so flippantly uttered, might somehow survive and be carried forward into the lives of those careless men, and ultimately lift them upward to the realization of the hope expressed in my hymn."

"A different appreciation of it was evinced during the Robert Raikes' Centennial in London. After there had been a number of addresses delivered, I was preparing to leave when the chairman of the meeting announced that the author of "Shall We Gather at the River?" was present, and I was requested by name to come forward. Men applauded and women waved their handkerchiefs as I went to the platform. It was a tribute to the hymn; but I felt, when it was over, that, after all, I had perhaps done some little good in the world, and I felt more than ever content to die when God called." On Children's Day in Brooklyn, in 1865, this song was sung by over 40,000 voices.

Go To The World!

After a brief, arduous battle with liver cancer, Canadian Sylvia Dunstan, the writer of this hymn, died in 1993 at the age of 38. For 13 years, Dunstan had served the United Church of Canada as a parish minister and prison chaplain. She is remembered by those who knew her for her passion for those in need, her gift of writing, and her love of liturgy.

SINE NOMINE ("without a name") was composed by Ralph Vaughan Williams. Erik Routley reported that the tune was at first rejected as being "jazz music," while Percy Dearmer stated that this tune is "one of the finest hymn tunes of the present century." Today most authorities agree with Dearmer.

Praise God, from Whom All Blessings Flow

This form of the Doxology was written by Neil Weatherhogg in 1988. The first published form of the text was in *The Presbyterian Hymnal - Hymns, Psalms, and Spiritual Songs* (1990). It is an inclusive language versification originally used by the congregation of Harvey Browne Memorial Presbyterian Church, Louisville, Kentucky, where he is pastor and head of staff. This is the first published form of the text.

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Worship Art

The children of our church are learning about the liturgical seasons by exploring worship art. The butterflies in worship this morning were crafted by our children. Although butterflies in the Bible aren't mentioned explicitly, their lifecycle is a remarkable illustration from nature of the transforming work of Jesus Christ in the lives of believers.

"Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!" (2 Corinthians 5:17, NLT)

The word transform is *metamorpheo* in Greek, from which we get the English term metamorphosis. It describes the type of change a caterpillar undergoes to become a butterfly. The same word is used to explain Christ's transfiguration. The idea conveys a radical change or complete transformation. At Jesus' transfiguration, his physical appearance was temporarily metamorphosed from an ordinary human to a divine being in all his glory.

"As the men watched, Jesus' appearance was transformed so that his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became as white as light." (Matthew 17:2, NIV)
