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Worship Music

On Pentecost They Gathered

This text by Jane Parker Huber was written for the celebration of Pentecost. There are some hymns that mention the person and work of the Holy Spirit but few speak of the Pentecost event as "the birthday of the church." This hymn contains several direct references to Pentecost from the second chapter of Acts. It ends with hope that the singular event which inspired the disciples to "turn the world upside down" (Acts 17:6) will move modern-day Christians to do the same.

Jane Parker Huber (1926-2008) was born of Presbyterian missionary parents in China and spent most of her childhood years on the campus of Hanover College, Indiana, where her father was president. Her mother served on the Board of Foreign Missions, Presbyterian Church U.S.A., and the National Council of Presbyterian Women. Huber has worked extensively in local churches, with Presbyterian Women and on women's issues with the Social Justice and Peacemaking Ministry Unit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and served on the Presbyterian Hymnal Committee. Since 1976, she has been a writer of hymns with inclusive language texts, mostly set to familiar tunes.

MUNICH is an old German chorale tune named for the German city of Munich. The present form was adapted by Felix Mendelssohn, who adapted and harmonized the melody in the oratorio *Elijah*.

Spirit of the Living God

Both the text and the tune of this hymn were written by Daniel Iverson (1890-1977). The story is told that George C. Stephans was conducting a revival in Orlando, Florida, in the spring of 1926. His friend, Rev. Daniel Iverson, a Presbyterian U.S. pastor from Lumberton, North Carolina, came and spent a few days with him. Iverson was extremely moved by the sermon he heard on the Holy Spirit and wrote the hymn that day, sharing it with his friends. E. Powell Lee, Stephans' music director, introduced the piece that night. Lee continued to spread the hymn through his work with Southern Baptist churches and through the Home Mission Board in Atlanta. Iverson spent his ministry serving churches in Georgia, North and South Carolina, and Florida. After his retirement in 1951, Iverson moved to Montreat, where he died.

Spirit, Spirit of Gentleness

Both the text and the tune of this contemporary hymn were written by James K. Manley in 1975 while he was working toward his Doctor of Ministry at Claremont School of Theology. After he completed the rough draft of his paper, he felt the "prodding and pushing" of the Holy Spirit as both a "comforter and challenger."

Manley's original text included the phrase "goaded your people" in the second verse. The Presbyterian Hymnal Committee changed the phrase to "gifted your people." Several printings included this change. Manley requested the original be restored, and it was restored to "goaded" in *Glory to God, the Presbyterian Hymnal*.

James K. Manley was born in 1940 in Holyoke, Massachusetts and was educated at Whittier College, Pacific School of Religion, and Claremont School of Theology. He was ordained to the ministry of the United Church of Christ in 1966, and he pastored several churches in California prior to his retirement.

O Day of Joy and Wonder!

Violet Nita (Critchett) Buchanan (Mrs. Andrew Sinclair Buchanan), was born in St. Marylabone, London, England, and resided in Westminster, London, England at the time of her death in 1975. She is a relatively new name in American hymnody, but not in British hymn circles. Both Mrs. Buchanan and her husband came from distinguished families. Her father, Sir Anderson Critchett, was a noted physician, and members of her husband's family helped important diplomatic posts. Mrs. Buchanan was active in her parish church and often noted that she was an avid supporter of fellowship between all Christian denominations.

In a pattern common to many hymns, the first two verses here declare how the coming of the Holy Spirit gave strength and courage to the early church, and the final verse becomes a corporate prayer for a sense of the presence of the Spirit, addressed as "Comforter divine."

Come, O Spirit, Dwell Among Us

This hymn text was written by Janie Alford in 1979. Janie Alford (1887-1986), a Presbyterian layperson and poet, was born in Nashville and attended Hume-Fogg High School. At Watkins Institute in Nashville she studied astronomy, journalism, and income tax. At the University of Tennessee in Nashville, which she attended for one semester, Alford studied library science.

At 18, Alford went to work to support her mother and sister. She was able to put her nephews through school and worked for over 40 years as a medical secretary to a doctor. Alford grew up in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, but transferred to the Moore Memorial Presbyterian Church, which later became the Westminster Presbyterian Church in Nashville. She was a charter member there and started the church's library. Alford wrote poetry all her life. At the suggestion of Hal Hopson, she was encouraged to write hymns based on the seasons of the church year.

EBENEZER is by Thomas John Williams (169-1944). It was published in 1980 and is best known by its alternate name which springs from the legend that it was found in a bottle that washed ashore during a storm onto the Welsh coast. There is no historical fact to support this, however. The melodic sequence is characteristic of many Welsh tunes.

ৰে Worship Art

Pentecost is the Seventh Sunday after Easter, or the fiftieth day of Eastertide. The name comes from the Greek word pentekoste which means fiftieth. On this day, often called the birthday of the church, we celebrate the descent of the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' apostles as they waited and prayed as Jesus instructed them. The coming of the Holy Spirit was dramatic and resulted in the infant church growing by leaps and bounds.

The liturgical color of the day is red, for the Holy Spirit. Red is the color of fire, of love, of power, and action. The bright red, yellow, and orange ribbons in our worship art call to mind the Holy Spirit, with the colors of flame and the movement of the wind when the banners are in procession. Today's paraments contain images of the Holy Spirit as a dove and flames.
