God of Grace and God of Glory

This text was written by Harry Emerson Fosdick for the opening of Riverside Church, New York City, in 1930. The hymn was sung at the dedication services in February 1931 and was first published in 1932. Fosdick sought to make the church ecumenical, serving the needs of different social classes and ethnic groups.

Harry Fosdick (1878-1969) attended Colgate University, Union Theological Seminary, New York City, and Columbia University. After ordination, he was pastor of First Baptist Church, Montclair, New Jersey. He taught homiletics and practical theology at Union Theological Seminary. From 1919 to 1926, he was preacher and associate minister of First Presbyterian Church, New York City. Fosdick accepted the call of Park Avenue Baptist Church, later renamed Riverside after the congregation moved to its present location overlooking the Hudson River. He served the church for 20 years until his retirement in 1946. He wrote 32 books and pioneered in radio preaching and pastoral counseling. He died in Bronxville, New York, at age 91.

Gloria Patri

This hymn, the Gloria Patri, dates to the beginning of the Christian church. Known as the Lesser Doxology, it derives its Trinitarian language from Matthew 28:19. Within Presbyterian/Reformed liturgies, the Gloria Patri is sung as a response after the Declaration of Pardon or after the Psalm.

The tune was composed by Henry Wellington Greatorex and published as "Gloria Patri No. 1." Greatorex (1813-1858) was born in England and received much of his musical training from his father. He came to the United States in 1836 and served as organist in Hartford, Connecticut prior to moving to New York City, where he served St. Paul's and then Calvary Protestant Episcopal Church. In 1853, he moved to Charleston, South Carolina, where he died of yellow fever.

This Is My Song

Lloyd Stone (1912-1993) was born in California and attended the University of Southern California as a music major, with the intent of becoming a teacher. Instead, he joined a circus bound for Hawaii and remained there for the rest of his life, writing poems and songs. This is his best known work; verses 1 and 2 were written in 1934 when Lloyd was 22 years old. Often combined with several additional verses by Georgia Harkness, the poem is typically sung to the tune Finlandia, composed by Jean Sibelius.

Lloyd also wrote a musical based on Joyce Kilmer's poem, "Trees," and several books of Hawaii-themed poems. Said one reviewer, "[Stone] does not sing of the palms and the surf, but of the earthy human beauty which is the heritage of the islands."

For the Healing of the Nations

Fred Kaan's hymns include both original work and translations. He sought to address issues of peace and justice. He was born in Haarlem in the Netherlands in 1929. He was baptized in St. Bavo Cathedral but his family did not attend church regularly. He lived through the Nazi occupation, saw three of his grandparents die of starvation, and witnessed his parents' deep involvement in the resistance movement. They took in a number of refugees. He became a pacifist and began attending church in his teens.

Having become interested in British Congregationalism (later to become the United Reformed Church) through a friendship, he attended Western College in Bristol. He was ordained in 1955 at the Windsor Road Congregational Church in Barry, Glamorgan. In 1963, he was called to be minister of the Pilgrim Church in Plymouth. It was in this congregation that he began to write hymns. He continued writing many more hymns throughout his life.

The Christian year includes two central cycles focused on major events in the life of Christ: the Christmas cycle (Advent-Christmas-Epiphany) and Eastertide (Lent-Easter-Pentecost). Each of these seasons begins with a time of preparation and anticipation followed by a time of celebration. A season designated as Ordinary Time follows each cycle. The word "ordinary" here does not mean "routine" or "not special." Instead, it refers to the "ordinal numbers" (first, second, third, etc.) used to name and count the Sundays (such as the Third Sunday after Epiphany). This term comes from the Latin ordinalis meaning "numbered" or "ordered," and tempus ordinarium, "measured time."

The first period of Ordinary Time, called the Season after Epiphany, begins on Epiphany Day and ends on the day before Ash Wednesday (the beginning of Lent). The central theme of this season is the calling of disciples and the early ministry of Jesus.

The second period of Ordinary Time, the Season after Pentecost, follows the Easter cycle. It begins the day after Pentecost and continues to Advent. The purpose of this season is to support new disciples and the whole congregation in living out the gifts and callings discerned during the Easter Season and commissioned on the Day of Pentecost. Every year, Christians experience the contrast between the central seasons of Christmas and Easter, where we see God in the events around the coming of Christ, and the in-between times, where we see, speak about, and join God's ongoing work in the world. We thus experience two regular cycles of preparation, celebration, and action in ministry each year, with the Ordinary Times as the primary periods of action.
