Sermon Notes

"All Saints' Day is a time to rejoice in all who through the ages have faithfully served the Lord. The day reminds us that we are part of one continuing, living communion of saints. It is a time to claim our kinship with the "glorious company of apostles ... the noble fellowship of prophets ... the white-robed army of martyrs" (Te Deum). It is a time to express our gratitude for all who in ages of darkness kept the faith, for those who have take the gospel to the ends of the earth, for prophetic voices who have called the church to be faithful in life and service, for all who have witnessed to God's justice and peace in every nation."

Worship Music Notes

Holy, Holy, Holy! Lord God Almighty

This text was written by Bishop Reginal Heber for Trinity Sunday and published in *Hymns Written and Adapted to the Weekly Church Service of the Year* (1827). Heber was born in Malpas, England, and educated at Brasenose College, Oxford, where he won prizes for his poetry. He was ordained in 1807 and became vicar of the family estate at Hodnet, Shropshire. In 1823, Heber was appointed bishop of Calcutta and ordained the first native Christian there. Heber died suddenly at the end of a day in which he had baptized 42 people. He wrote all his hymns before he went to India.

NICAEA was composed by John Bacchus Dykes for this text and published in *Hymns Ancient and Modern* (1861). Dykes named the tune NICAEA because the text expounded the doctrine of the Trinity as found in the Nicene Creed. Dykes was born in Hull, England, and by the age of ten was the assistant organist at St. John's Church, Hull, where his grandfather was vicar. He studied at Wakefield and St. Catharine's College, Cambridge, where he co-founded the Cambridge University Musical Society. He was ordained in 1847 as curate of Malton. For a short time he was canon of Durham Cathedral, then precentor. In 1862, he became vicar of St. Oswald's, Durham. He published sermons and articles on religion, but is best known for the over 300 hymn tunes he composed.

O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing

The text was written by Charles Wesley on the first anniversary of his spiritual conversion (1740). He was inspired to write the poem after a conversation with Moravian Peter Böhler during which Wesley asked him about praising Christ. Böhler replied, "Had I a thousand tongues, I would praise Him with them all. The original hymn contained 18 verses and was titled "For the anniversary day of one's conversation." The first verse began, "Glory to God, and praise, and love. The hymn has long been the first selection in Methodist collections.

Charles Wesley was the 18th child of Samuel and Susanna Wesley. In 1735, he came to colonial Georgia as secretary to General Oglethorpe, having previously received both deacon's and priest's orders. But it was a personal conversion experience on Whitsunday 1738 under the influence of the Moravians that gave him "rest in his soul" and released in him the gift of hymn writing. He is known to have written more than 6,000 hymns and by some counts as many as 6,500. Although he dedicated his life to the Methodist movement, he never relinquished his ordination in the Church of England.

AZMON was composed by Carl Gotthelf Glaser and arranged by Lowell Mason.

For All the Saints

The text was written by William Walsham How for All Saints' Day, 1864. It is a commentary on the phrase, "I believe in the communion of saints" from The Apostles' Creed. The text was first published in Earl Nelson's *Hymns for the Saints' Days* (1864), where it was titled "Saints Day Hymn - Cloud of Witnesses - Hebrew 12:1." The original hymn contained 11 verses, but most collections have edited them to six or fewer.

SINE NOMINE ("without a name") was composed by Ralph Vaughan Williams as the setting for this text in *The English Hymnal* (1906). Erik Routley reported that the tune was at first rejected as being "jazz music," while Percy Dearmer stated that this tune is "one of the finest hymn tunes of the present century." Today most authorities agree with Dearmer.

I Sing a Song of the Saints of God

This text was written by Lesbia Scott and was "meant for use on Saints' days, to impress the fact that sainthood is a living possibility today." It was not intended for publication but instead was written for Scott's

own children. It was later published in *Everyday Hymns for Children* (1929). Lesbie Scott was born in 1898 in London and educated at Panen's Croft School in Sussex. In addition to her hymns, Scott wrote religious dramas. GRAND ISLE was composed by John Henry Hopkins, the nephew of John Henry Hopkins, Jr.

"I'm loving entering into this week that holds some festive days. I've written previously that the trinity of days of Halloween, the Feast of All Saints, and the Feast of All Souls has long been a favorite time for me—a thin place in the turning of the year. These days are haunted for me in a good way; they offer an occasion to remember, to reflect, and to offer thanks for those who have shaped my path by the path that they walked. These days remind us that in the body of Christ, death does not release us from being in community with one another.

As you move through this week, who lingers close in your memory? Who walked with you in a way that inspired and made possible the path that you travel? Remembering that in these days, the veil thins not only toward the past but also toward the future, how are you walking through this life in a way that will help make possible the paths of those who follow?"




