Worship Music Notes

Comfort, Comfort Now My People

Johannes Olearus was an influential church leader, well connected in the noble courts of Germany. He compiled and wrote for the major hymnal used in Germany in his time. He also wrote devotional books and a commentary on the Bible. In many ways he was similar to the prophet Isaiah. Isaiah seems to have been associated with Judah's royal court in some way. He also wrote both poetry and prose, both words of devotion and theology. And Isaiah's world, like that of Olearius, was shattered by war.

From our perspective, we see that Isaiah's words shoot past Babylon to John the Baptist, announcing the arrival of Jesus the Messiah. It is a word of hope and comfort that again rang out in 17th century Germany and still rings out today. People in darkness can see the light as they focus their faith on Jesus Christ.

It Came Upon the Midnight Clear

Edmund Hamilton Sears is the author of two Christmas carols that are mirror images of each other, written 15 years apart. Sears was born in Sandisfield, Massachusetts, in 1819, and attended Union College in Schenectady, then Harvard Divinity School. He was ordained in the Unitarian ministry and chose to devote himself to small towns in Massachusetts, where he had

time to study, think, and write.

At 24, he wrote "Calm on the Listening Ear," a Christmas carol based on the song of the angels in Luke 2. It proved very similar to the more-famous carol he would later write. Having the same meter and theme, and it can be sung to the same tune:

Calm on the listening ear of night, come heaven's melodious strains, Where wild Judea stretches far, her silver-mantled plains. Celestial choirs, from courts above, shed sacred glories there, And angels, with their sparkling lyres, make music on the air.

Fifteen years later, he wrote its more famous twin. "It Came upon the Midnight Clear" is an unusual carol in that there is no mention of Christ, of the newborn Babe, or of the Savior's mission. Sears, after all, was Unitarian. The author's only focus is the angelic request for peace on earth.

Notice again the date of the hymn (1849). It was written as the clouds of civil strife were darkening the United States, setting the stage for the War Between the States. We can grasp the concern that drove Edmund to write this hymn by reading a stanza now usually omitted from most hymnals:

Yet with the woes of sin and strife, the world hath suffered long; Beneath the angel-strain have rolled two thousand years of wrong; And man, at war with man, hurts not the love song which they bring; O hush the noise, ye men of strife, and hear the angels sing!

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Worship Art Notes

Today's worship guide cover is a canvas collage with acrylic and gilding by Carmelle Beaugelin titled *Mary's Golden Annunciation*. The following is an excerpt of the artist's statement.

"Mary's Golden Annunciation depicts not only a remarkable encounter, but also the moment that divinity in human form was conceived. It is my speculation that the divinity of God entered Mary's body no sooner than Mary's "yes" went out from her mouth. In a time when women had few options other than marriage, Mary's consent to a potentially unwed motherhood is a brave act of subversive agency. In Mary's "yes," uttered in her Magnificat, we see the transformation of a young teenage girl from fearful to determined, from simply accepting to deciding, from passivity to agency, from betrothed to surrogate mother of God—an honor rarer than gold. Perhaps the most remarkable annunciation in this passage is not the messenger's revelation to Mary, but Mary's "yes" to the call."

Sermon Notes

Our stories of the past shape who we are today. The Christmas story is a story passed down from generation to generation. A story of God with us, Emmanuel. A story of a baby born in a time of conflict bringing hope and light. A story that speaks to us anew each Advent season and calls us forth to be changed for the better. Thanks be to God for the stories passed down to us that we too are invited to pass on to generations to come.


